January 10, 1945 - November 26, 2021

Howard J. Mitchell, age 76, of Holly, died Fri. Nov. 26, 2021. He was born in Flint on Jan. 10, 1945 to Albert and Evelyn (Bradley) Mitchell. He was a lifelong resident of Holly from a pioneering family that settled in Holly in 1837. He was a Vietnam Veteran, serving in the US Army. He worked at General Motors Metal Fab (now called GM Flint Assembly) plant on VanSlyke. He was a former member of Farm Bureau, Holly American Legion, Holly Kiwanis, and Holly JC's. Surviving are 4 siblings, Marilyn (Ralph) Meredith of Port Huron, MI, David Mitchell of Byron, MI, Arlene Mitchell of Seattle, WA, and Glen (Candace) Mitchell of Holly; nieces and nephews Brian Meredith, Devin (Tammy) Meredith, Erlinda Meredith, Renee (Shane) Hernandez, John Spencer, and Joeseeph (Ahnjayla) Spencer; and many friends. 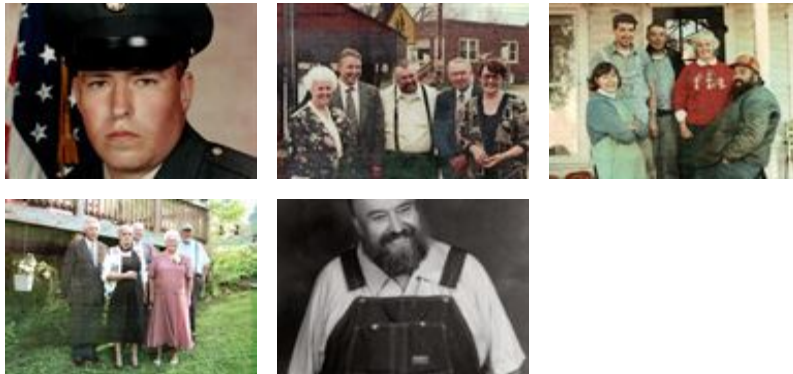

“ I was saddened that Howard had passed. To his family and friends, my thoughts and prayers are with you during this difficult time. As I learned of this on Facebook, I went and dusted off the 1963 Tell-Tale Yearbook to relive my memories of Howard. Two came to mind, and I would like to share the smile they brought to me as I recalled them.

As you look under his name in the 1963 Tell-Tale Yearbook, you see that Howard’s nickname was “Huey,” well yes and no. I was a co-editor of that yearbook (kind of like being a 3rd Cousin of a rich person... so what.). I recall that Sally O. was given the task of assigning those ‘forever-in-time’ nicknames. Sally had asked a few of his teammates on the Broncos football team what they called Howard. Indeed a logical choice, but there is a certain camaraderie amongst players that do not extend to others. Howard had both that respect and involvement with the team to earn and enjoy the athletic name they gave him. Often I would hear his teammates lovingly refer to Howard as “B__ y Huey,” where the B__ y adjective refers to a young infant. And that was the nickname that was under his photo in the First Draft of the 1963 Tell-Tale Yearbook. Once I told Sally the background, I recall her opening the ‘white-out’ and covering the adjective (the backspace key did not exist at the time) ... leaving “Huey.”

The second great memory was our communal lunch table during our Senior year. The same typical group of about ten would eat at the same table each day. (some of those I recall are: Larry B., Dick C., Lance H., John H., John K., Jim L., Howard M., Ken U., Doug W., and more).

Somehow, this group of misfits came up with a game where we considered the top of our lunch table as a hockey rink and a penny as the puck. The concept was by pushing, sliding, and even flicking the penny, to have it go over the end of the table, pass the one goalie at each end. (Pong was not even a concept). We would crowd around the table, choose sides, and drop the penny in the center to begin the game. Many six-year-olds can identify with the complex strategy that this game presents... simply smack the opposing team’s hand that has the penny, so they cannot ‘shoot’ the

penny. All of us had heard of the word testosterone but thought it was a college entrance exam. The play was always fast and even created a few injuries... a couple of dislocated thumbs. We 'loved' it, every day!

Now that you understand the game, I recall a tied game only because of the final results reaction.

I was the goalie that day.

It was then that the 5-minute bell rang for us to return to class.

One last shot could win 'Championship of the Day'.

The penny was dropped.

Unexpectedly Howard's hand landed on the penny.

No one smacked Howard's hand.

From the center of the table, Howard stood up, with that light grin on his face,

Positioned the penny under his Thumb and moved as if in slow motion, forward.

Not only did he gently move me away from the end of the table, but Howard also moved me in the chair I was sitting.

As the penny pushed past the end of the table and dropped to the floor, winning the 'Championship of the Day, everyone jumped up and cheered.

I am still smiling as I share this with you.

For a short time, we were all together; it has created a lifetime of memories.

Howard will be missed but remembered.
